COMING-OUT-TO-BIGOTS TIPS

- 1. You don't have to change them just don't let them change you.
- Don't let them get to you by reacting to anger with anger.
- 3. Be out by being yourself. They're the ones that make the big deal about it.
- 4. Practice coming out to bigots on-line in CompuServe on Rush Limbaugh's forum or in Christianity On-line in America Online or in the many Internet sites. When on-line you can even eavesdrop without them knowing you are there. From listening you can get a really good idea of how these people think—or rather, don't think. When you feel ready, jump in. It's safe and fun, and because most chat lines use nicknames, it's totally anonymous.

On CompuServe I entered the room where these dittoheads were gay bashing and announced that "there is a lesbian amongst you." They hit me pretty hard with their hostile rhetoric, but there was one person who, although holding similar antigay views, felt embarrassed by how hostile and harsh the "boys" were being to me. We began a private E-mail communication that lasted several months, and he actually came to believe that antigay sentiment was "inhuman and un-Christian."

The Books of the Last Herald-Mage by Mercedes Lackey

Magic's Pawn: Book 1 Magic's Promise: Book 2 Magic's Price: Book 3

▲ The Bible says, "If a man lies with a man as one lies with a women. . . He must be put to death" —Leviticus 20:13.

- "Yes, but what a way to go."

"Yes, and that's why I'm a lesbian."

It also says in the Bible that "he who touches a pig must be put to death," and also that "he who wears clothing woven of two materials shall be put to death." So if you want to be literal, no more NFL (touching pigskin = death) and no more poly-cotton blends. And it wasn't us gays who invented polyester!"

▲ Gays recruit children.

- "I'd worry more about all the straight people who molest them." "Since both my parents are straight, it seems as if heteros are doing all the recruiting."

▲ We have to do something about the gay agenda.

-"Do you have a copy of it, because when I signed up for being gay, I didn't get a copy. My recruiter said it was in the mail, but I never got it!"

▲ You can't be gay and be a Christian

- "I'm sorry, I must have a misprint in my Bible . . . I'll have to take it back. It doesn't say, 'For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten son, that whosoever believeth in him, *except homosexuals*, should not perish but have everlasting life."

▲ Homosexuals are already covered under the Constitution just like the rest of us. What they want are *special rights*. We oppose *special rights* for homosexuals.

- "If special means the right to get and keep a job based on merit, equal access to housing, renting a hotel room and being served food in a restaurant . . . If special means the right to have and raise children without the state seizing them, and the right to walk down a street and not get attacked because of who you are and whom you love . . . then you're right: I want the same special rights of all American citizens. And it looks as if you want the very special right to discriminate against those you hate. We call that 'special righteousness.'"
- ▲ Local ordinances for gay men and lesbians force the rest of us to live against our religious beliefs. We're entitled to our rights too.
 - "You can still have a right to hate, but we are entitled to our right to love."

▲ Homosexuals have an abominable lifestyle. People who care about traditional family values must not encourage the open expression of sexual depravity.

- "Since when are discrimination, hate, and bigotry traditional family values?" "Family values! You must be talking about the Manson family . . . and they were straight." "The family values we uphold are support, love, understanding, and respect."

But the bottom line to all of this is, "Big Bertha created me, so it can't be wrong."

STOP YOURSELF FROM BECOMING A BIGOT

If we truly do stop and examine ourselves, we might be shocked to find our own bigotry. Most everyone thinks of themselves as kind, loving, and unjudging. But if you think about it, that person who treated you horribly in your last relationship still thinks of her—or himself as a wonderful person. Look at the personals ads. Are there really that many people who are "sincere, attractive, and have a great sense of humor"? If you've ever responded to a personal ad, you knew that people lie, lie, lie.

Guess what? The whole world is not living in self-deception except for you.

Gay Influence Felt at Polls

A new study has found that gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender (GLBT) citizens are having a significant -- and growing -- impact on elections around the United States, not only by voting themselves but by raising awareness of GLBT issues among the general electorate. The Gill Foundation's "Out and Into the Voting Booth" study, released on February 16, largely confirms conventional wisdom about the 4 - 6 percent of U.S. voters who identify as queer, but for the first time it attempts to quantify that impact. The study found that 92 percent of GLBT respondents were registered to vote, with 52 percent claiming they voted in all elections and 34 percent saying they voted in most elections. If accurate, these numbers suggest that the "out" GLBT community is more politically active than the population at large. However, their voting political philosophy is not terribly different: 43 percent of GLBT voters identify as moderate compared to 40 percent of voters in the total population.

Non-Gays Who Know Gays Affected

In November, the Gill Foundation released findings from its study of gays' influence on non-gay voters (see www. PlanetOut.com News of November 1, 2000). Of a sample of 2,001 non-gay likely U.S. voters, 82 percent acknowledged knowing a gay, lesbian, or bisexual -- and those who did showed substantially more gay-supportive attitudes than the rest on several key issues. Of those familiar with GLBT people, 37 percent said their personal relationships had increased their knowledge of queer issues. "Public policy makers must realize that the percentage of self-identified LGBT voters will continue to increase," concludes the Gill Foundation in its introduction to the study. "As it does, the impact these voters have on family, friends, and colleagues will also grow. Thus, the number of voters interested in equal rights for LGBT people is not limited only to LGBT voters, but is also inclusive of a much larger, and growing, segment of the population." Silence Not Golden However, the study also revealed that insularity, lack of interest in public policy, and high numbers of GLBT people who remain in the closet all dampen their impact at the polls. Just less than half of respondents said they rarely discuss public policy issues with anyone. Seventy-two percent said they speak with gay and lesbian friends about issues, while just 51 percent say they discuss the same issues with non-gay friends. Half of the respondents said they considered themselves to be very open about their sexual orientation, while a third said they were not open at all. "The closet is our adversary in empowering LGBT voters, as well as their families, friends and coworkers," said Michael Colby of the gay National Stonewall Democrats in a statement. "When we are in the closet, when we are not talking about our issues in our personal relationships, we are not educating the people around us. Of course we can engage in politics without discussing intimate details about us. Yet, by shedding the closet and being out and open, we are influencing the minds and the voting behavior of people around us." The study can be

an eight-step process to resolve conflict. Try it.

Step 1: Acknowledge Who It Is You Dislike

Find someone who really gets to you. They might be someone who is ignorant, fat, different. They might be that homophobic redneck who lives next door. Perhaps it is someone you have a major conflict or disagreement with. Write down some names here.

Step 2: Admit Your Own Prejudices

Pick one person from the above list and write down all your annoyances about that person or about certain aspects of that person. What about him or her really bugs you? What are your judgments about that person? What are your limiting beliefs? Don't worry here about being politically incorrect. "I can't stand to look at someone so fat." "He is such a fag." "This guy is so stupid." "I don't want anyone to see me with them." "He's a hopeless homophobe." Let it all out.

Step 3: Create Possibility

Write down some of the possibilities of your relationship. "We could be friendly toward each other." We could have understanding of each other."

Don't stick to reality. Imagine the most positive kind of relationship.

A friend of mine had huge conflict with her landlord, who was trying to evict her because she was gay. She couldn't imagine any possibility of resolving her conflict, other than in court. But when she was pushed to really imagine what some *positive* possibilities of their relationship could be, she came up with: "We could live together without conflict." "We could stop threatening each other." And the unimaginable: "This dyke and this bigot could become friends."

Of course she thought becoming friends was not only highly unlikely but very undesirable. But after she went through this eight-step procedure, that is exactly what happened.

Write the possibilities here.

Step 4: Take Action

Initiate a conversation with the person and share with him or her your vision of the possibilities of your relationship. "I want to talk to you because I think we can find things we have in common and become friends."

Step 5: Dig Out Their Concerns

Ask them what their upsets are, and really listen.

Step 6: Re-create Their Concerns Without Judgment

Mirror their concerns back to them without getting defensive. "So you think gay people are sinners? I get that." Once you repeat their concerts, dig out more. "Is there anything else?" This communication can sound like this . .

Them: I think that you are an unfit mother because you are gay.

You: So you think because I'm gay I am not a good mother?

Them: Yes

You: What else is upsetting you?

Them: I just don't like it. It makes me uncomfortable. **You:** So me being gay makes you uncomfortable. I get that. Anything else?

Them: I think it's sick.

You: So you think I'm sick because I'm gay, right?

Them: Yes

You: I get that you think that. Anything else?

Get the idea? Don't react. Don't get hooked into their drama.

Step 7: Repeat Your Vision

After you truly exhaust this person of all concerns and you've truly listened and re-created their concerns, transformation is possible. It is at this point that you can once again express your vision of a relationship with this person that is your vision of the world. "I still believe that despite our different beliefs, if we got to know each other, we could like each other."

Step 8: Open Yourself to Unimagined Possibilities

Don't be surprised if the other person shares a possibility you haven't even thought of. If you give another person an opportunity to really express his or her grievances, and if that person feels truly received and heard, in many cases the grievances will vanish. For when you open the space for another to be heard, you open up the possibility of change.
